FOUNDER OF THE EDIRIMANNE COREA FAMILY UNION



Don Henri Richard Attygalle Corea or Henri Corea as he was more popularly known, was the only son of James Alfred Corea and Eugenie Corea. James Alfred Corea, who owned Potuwille and Mugunuatuwane, two coconut plantations, was Mohandiram of Madampe in 1899. Eugenie was a daughter of Dr. John Attygalle, the first Colonial Surgeon of Ceylon. They resided at 'Corea Court' in Madampe. Henri had but one sibling, his elder sister Amybelle.

Educated at Royal College, it was no doubt the influence of his uncle Mr. Theodore. P. Attygalle, the first Sinhala Deputy Inspector General of Police and his brother Henry Attygalle, also a police officer that prompted him to enlist as a Sub Inspector of Police. Henri lost his father when he was just four years old, but came under the steadying influence of his godfather Sir Soloman Dias Bandaranaike and his father's cousin and close friend Victor Corea, as he grew up.

Sir Soloman was a witness at the wedding, when Henri married Claire Maude, the daughter of Gate Mudliyar Gerald De Alwis and his wife, Alice. Claire was Head Girl of Ladies College Colombo and it is said that Henri had spotted her on the balcony of her father's house and was instantly smitten.

Henri remembered with affection, his godfather, Sir Solomon, who gifted him with the first of many horses he owned. A

keen horseman, he was the live wire, founder member and secretary of the Colombo Horse Club, started under the partonage of his cousin, Sir John Kotalawela. Paper-chases on horseback, rides along the beach, lunch at Kandawela and riding back in the moonlight, was the order of the day, on any week-end, in those carefree mid 1950's. With the police mounted division joining in, the numbers participating, ranged from 25-35 at any given time. Henri and Gerald Leembruggen established the Colombo City Traffic Division in the early 1950's. Henri started the Traffic Circus', using it as a tool, to teach the public road safety, This was a popular event with school children and adults alike. Much later, as an Assistant Superintendent of Police in charge of Traffic and Information', Henri wrote a daily column on traffic for the 'Observer', titled, 'We are telling you'.

During this period, Henri was selected, to escort dignitaries and royalty visiting the Island. He earned the sobriquet of 'Dear Henri' when King Mahendra of Nepal shot a stag, in the Wilpattu sanctuary. Being 'Buddha Jayanti' year, this incident became a national issue that threatened the stability of Mr. S.W.R.D. Bandaranaike's government. There is no doubt that it was his regard for Sir Solomon that prompted him to help the government of the day, tide over that embarrassment. Taking the rap, Henri was transferred to Kurunegala, where he faced the riots of 1958, handling Wariyapola, Nikeweratiya, Maho and Ambanpola. In 1959 he was transferred to Kandy as ASP. After a short stint in Colombo he returned to Kurunegala. It was here that he threatened to horsewhip (on a matter of principle) the Government Agent. Transferred overnight to Jaffna, he demanded an inquiry, was exonerated and transferred to Ratnapura. Unfortunately, with this episode, he was labeled as disloyal to the government of Mrs. Bandaranaike, a stigma he was to carry for the rest of his service. Henri was retired, shortly thereafter by the government. But, fighting back, he took his case before the Public Service Commission. Reinstated, he rose to the rank of Senior Superintendent of Police and then opted to a premature retirement, when Mrs. Bandaranaike's government was returned to power in 1970. Henri's niece, Mrs. Silva Obeyesekera, was then a Minister, in Mrs. Bandaranaike's government. Henri never sought political patronage to foster his career.

Henri served a short spell at Lake House as its Security Manager. With his lifelong friend Edward (Bugs) Mason, he promoted the 'Old Crocks Rally', cycle, hackery, pony and Ridge-backs. In retirement he devoted his time to history and research, especially that pertaining to the Corea family. Henri was associated with the Archeological Department, in an attempt to identify the burial site of Prince Vijaya. He contributed a series of historical romances to the 'Sunday Observer', writing under the penname of 'Aeroc'.

Through the turbulent periods, it was Claire by his side and his faith in God that gave Henri the strength to face all adversities that came his way. Henri practiced his commitment to Christ in true spirit, with tolerance and respect for all religions. In 1960, hospitalized for almost nine months, undergoing a series of operations, he would be wheeled into the theatre holding a small crucifix. Henri was a teetotaller, who abhorred gambling. Henri and Claire ensured the their six children, Ilona, Randunna, Deva, Uttum, Ranmali and Aruni attended Sunday school and service. A study of the Bible in his latter years mellowed him. Writing to his grandchildren, he said, 'Go before the lord in prayer each morning asking forgiveness, for any wrong done unwittingly'. Henri's credo in life was, to be of assistance to whoever, whenever the opportunity arose. Seeing a need to unite the family, Henri forged what is today, the 'Edrimanne Corea Family Union'. He passed away on the 8th of January 1998. Accorded a ceremonial police funeral, the many people from all walks of life who attended, were a tribute to his memory.

In fulfillment of the promise held out during my address at the Annual General Meeting, the 'Corea Family Nite' was held at the Harbour Room of the Grand Oriental Hotel with its ambience and the presence of 200 people combining to make an elegant and splendid picture. An international buffet, music for dancing, competitions and prizes that included a return air ticket, provided all the excitement of a resplendently beautiful evening together.

The Corea Youth Fellowship, which I was blessed to be able to inaugurate within the Edirimanne Corea Family Union, provided an action packed demonstration of participation with a floor show and the singing of carols by candlelight. I was very encouraged by the many telephone calls (and I want to say 'thank you' to those who took the trouble to pick up the telephone) telling me how very much they appreciated and enjoyed the 'Family Nite'.

DOMINICUS COREA COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF THE SINHALESE FORCES AND KING OF KOTTE & SITAVAKA

The Corea Family trace their descent from Edirilla Bandara who was converted to Catholicism by the Portugese and given the name Dominicus Corea.

Dominicus received a Christian education in Colombo, in the company of Prince Konappu Bandara, who later became King Vimaladharmasuriya of Kandy. Trained, moreover from boyhood to warlike pursuits, Dominicus was skilled in arms, and was dreaded as being one of the most expert swordsmen of his day.

Of the Sinhalese " mudaliyars of renown, bred in war " in the service of Don Juan Dharmapala of Kotte, there was scarcely anyone more distinguished for valour, and certainly none more remarkable for good looks and a fine presence, than the youthful Dominicus Corea.

Entranced by the beauty of one of the ladies of King Rajasinha's harem, the young Dominicus left Colombo and practically deserted to Sitavaka, to take service under King Rajasinha so as to be near the object of his affections. He found himself in serious trouble when he indiscreetly acquainted the King with the particular nature of his aspirations which brought him to Sitavaka. As the "lady in the

case "was a special favorite of the King, Rajasinha was aroused to furious anger and gave instant orders to one of his servants to kill Corea, and the latter fled the Capital. Almost by a miracle as it were, Corea escaped death. Despite the profuse loss of blood from a terrible wound in his neck, he dragged himself to the hut of a woman who lived hard by who proved to be as good as any skilled vedarala. In a few days time her ministrations of medicinal herbs proved efficacious enough to permit him to get back to Colombo. This incident gave him a nickname Mal Degolado (the "ill-beheaded") which stuck to him for life.

This experience sobered Corea as nothing else could have done, and from that day he was a greatly changed man. He made his submission to Dharmapala, whom he undertook to serve loyally and courageously thenceforth. Right well did he fulfill his promise, at least throughout the stirring times that followed immediately upon the death of the dreaded Rajasinha of Sitavaka. In the brisk fighting that ensued till that Kingdom was reduced to subjection and annexed to the territories of the King of Kotte, Corea established for himself a great military reputation. He was always selected by

he chose to contest a formidable opponent who

Dharmapala and his Portugese allies to lead the most difficult and most hazardous of military enterprises. According to de Queyroz the great Portugese historian " Dominicus Carea accomplished so many and such arduous enterprises, which are not specified on account of the number, with extraordinary success ". Not the least of these notable enterprises was the swiftness and completeness of his subjugation of Denavaka, a district extensive in area, difficult of access, and peopled by hardy fighting men. Swiftness to move, as well as to strike, was the keynote of his military methods and in the enterpise upon which he had just started, he spared neither himself nor his men. Because he deserved this honour, he was elevated to the dignity of Vikramasinha or Commander-in-Chief of the Sinhalese forces. He was a special favorite of the Portugese General de Azavedo.

But Corea was at heart a rebel. General de Azavedo was prostrated with grief when Corea raised the standard of revolt against Dharmapala. Corea fled to the Court of his friend Vimaladharmasuriya, King of Kandy. Vimaladharma was too shrewd a man not to realise that the security of his own Kingdom depended in great measure upon the

continuance in health and power, of a man of the capacity of Dominicus Corea to fight the hated Portugese. He sought to honour him to the fullest extent possible and with due ceremonial and formality, gave Corea the Kingdoms of Kotte and Sitavaka. More than that "he accorded him the precedence of a King" and gave him a Royal Princess of the Court, the daughter of the sub-King Vidiya Bandara in marriage. The marriage was solemnised with all the stately ritual and circumstance, pomp and pageantry prescribed for the nuptials of Sinhalese royalty. Vimaladharma held a magnificient reception at the palace.

A fortnight later, Corea was busy making preparations to renew the fight with the Portugese. He successfully led the forces of Vimaladharmasuriya against the army led by the Portugese General Don Jeronimo de Azavedo. Subsequently, he was captured in battle and quartered as a rebel by Azavodo. He was executed on July 14, 1596, in the thirty-first year of his age.

national leaders for the release of the fighters in the Temperance Movement. He vehemently fought for the reform of the Constitution in order that Ceylon could free herself from arbitrary, autocratic and imperial rule and bondage. He presided over a meeting held at the Tower Hall in 1924 where all the leaders of the Sinhalese, Tamil and Muslim communities met together and pledged to be united in a nation building effort. At this meeting he was hailed as a great national hero and the embodiment of racial, religious and communal unity.

Victor Corea and his brother, C.E. Corea protected the muslims in the Chilaw area from the wrath of the embittered Sinhalese. The Corea brothers were responsible for completely exonerating the people of Chilaw from paying damages which was a penalty imposed on all citizens of Ceylon. They both championed the cause of national unity.

Although a Christian, Victor Corea initiated the construction of 2 Buddhist temples in Chilaw which cemented a strong bond of friendship between the 2 religious faiths. He was by tradition closely associated with the Munneswaram Temple and handled all its legal matters.

Dissatisfied with the newspapers, Victor Corea started his own printing press at Sinhapura and published the Sinhala journal, Lanka Tharuna Handa in order to inculcate a feeling of nationalism and a distaste for what was alien and foreign as was done by Mahatma Gandhi in India.

In the political arena, wherever a rift occurred between the North and South, Victor Corea never permitted that rift to widen into a gulf. Many a time he crossed Elephant Pass and stretched his hand of friendship to the Tamil leaders and the rift became a bedrock of goodwill at all times.

Victor Corea was proud to be a Sinhalese. His patriotism and his impatience to free his countrymen from the bondage of the British imperialists knew no bounds. At every turn he warned the British that their days in Ceylon were numbered. Every action of his was pro-Sinhala. He named his residence 'Sinhapura' and his letterheads carried his crest in gold print of a lion resting its head on its forepaws, rays of the sun in the background and the challenging caption 'Wake not the sleeping Lion King'.

It was Victor Corea who rose against the orders

sent out to the Diyawadana Nilame by the Government Agent, Kandy a Britisher, to stop forthwith the beating of Hewisi in the Dalada Maligawa because it was a nuisance to his wife. Victor Corea rose on this occasion to display the courage and guts he was well known to possess by asking the GA to remove his wife to any place he liked and that the Hewisi in the Maligawa must continue in accordance with tradition.

If the Diyawadana Nilame was not prepared to continue the beating of Hewisi, he vowed that he would come to the Maligawa and beat the Hewisi, himself. Since Victor Corea, by that time was known to be a man of action who would live up to his word, the GA withdrew his order, fearing there would be unrest in the country. The beating of Hewisi has continued ever since.

Victor Corea was a brilliant speaker who inspired people to be national minded. The Times of Ceylon carried the following article - "The Tower Hall in Maradana was the scene of an electrifying drama. The occasion was a political meeting. It was the climax of a day of national mourning in remembrance of the declaration of Martial Law on June 4, 1915. As this story unfolds, the speaker on the platform is Mr. C.E. Victor S. Corea.

June 4, 1915 was a Sunday and the thousands who packed the Tower Hall and its environs exploded in an orgasm of applause. The Tower Hall was packed to utmost capacity. On the verandahs outside a tightly wedged mass of humanity surged to and fro, a large number remaining on the street outside.

Such was the magnetic attraction of Mr. C.E. Victor S. Corea that the police party present was led by the acting Inspector General of Police himself.

Before a bench of 2 judges comprised of Mr. A.S. Ponnambalam, District Judge and Magistrate, Mr. S. Chelliah and a large gathering of lawyers and members of the public, Mr. C.A.L. Corea, Crown Proctor, Chilaw, addressing Court said they were meeting that morning to pay their homage and tribute to the memory of the oldest lawyer of the Bar not only of Chilaw but the whole island.

"Mr. Victor Corea was an elder statesman. Educated at S. Thomas' College, one of the P remier institutes of the island, Mr. Corea rose to courts and in the rooms of the councils of state. He knew no fear, no trepidation. If it is true that cowards die many times before their death but the valiant tastes of death but once, Mr. Corea was that man of valour. He stood up to his opponent, he stood up to the Judge when occasion demanded. Every man is placed upon this planet with a divine purpose. Every gesture, every utterance shapes human destiny more often in a Court of Justice than anywhere else in the world. Mr. Corea fulfilled that purpose, that destiny in abundant measure. His loins were always girded and his lights burning but the sparks of that light have flickered out. Yet the glow will gleam with greater lustre."

The District Judge of Chilaw, Mr. A. S. Ponnambalam in paying a tribute to the late Victor Corea said "Even during his lifetime his name and fame had become legendary. It has been said that his name is enshrined in our legal literature. In a sense it is so. He was essentially a relentless and clean fighter who will always be remembered."

In Parliment at the time of Victor Corea's death, Hon. M. Balasundera (FP-Kopay) said - he remembered the late Mr. Corea working on the roads in protest against the Poll Tax. Since that time he had known of Mr. Corea as being greatly interested in the youth of this country and his sincerity of purpose had put him in the forefront of that band of national leaders whose efforts had been crowned with the attainment of independence by this country. Unlike the pseudonationalists of today, the late Mr. Corea was one who fought for the people of the country as a whole; he had no distinction between one community and another. "Let us" he said, "take to heart the lesson and inspiration of his life".

Dr J. A. E. Corea

Dr James Alfred Ernest Corea was the son of Charles Edgar Corea & Henrietta Corea and brother of C. E. Corea & C.E.Victor S. Corea.

Being of a much milder disposition, Dr Corea never displayed the forward and aggressive qualities of his brothers. He was a good man greatly respected and emulated by those who had the good fortune to know him. During the 'parangi' scourge in this country he offered to go into the 'parangi' infected areas to treat those afflicted with the diesease. As a medical man practicing in Chilaw and its suburbs, after giving up his short stint in Government service as a Medical Officer, he endeared himself to all that sought his services. Nobody knocking at his door, day or night, went away disappointed. His service was voluntary and to the most part, free.

For a past time he took to painting both in oil and water-colour. A little known fact about him was that he came first in Art when he sat for the Commonwealth Cambridge Junior Examination. His masterpiece one might say, was his copy done in oils of the famous Hoffman's painting The Light of the World'.

Dr Corea was a Christian of a firm faith. In keeping with his Christian ideals he, together with Dr A. S. Goonewardene of Panadura (Father of the late Leslie Goonewardene) founded the National Missionary Society, an organisation that had for its primary concern, the offering of financial assistance to the needy.

Dr Corea died in the year 1939.

As a politician, he challenged the mite of the British government by opposing the iniquitous Poll Tax in 1921, was arrested and put into jail. Being a man of reckoning he was offered the choice of the European diet or native diet. Being a patriot, he chose the native diet, but the food was so badly prepared that he starved during his first 42 hours in jail. He declined the offers of special diet, special clothes and other privileges and chose to be treated like all other prisoners. He donned a coarse prison garb and spent his month in jail, beating coconut husks, twisting coir rope and breaking metal. He lived on the diet of plain bread just as the other prisoners did. He spent sleepless nights unable to put up with the hard bug infested planks with no pillow. Victor Corea's determined stand to abolish the Poll Tax for his people had no parallel in this country or elsewhere in the world, creating such a sensation and winning both love and admiration from the common masses. Hundreds and thousands of people from all parts of the country flocked to see this spectacle... a man of wealth and an advocate of the supreme court, relentlessly fighting the cause of his people and breaking metal on the road under the heat of the scorching sun. The British government realising that Victor Corea was gaining popularity as a national hero found him to be a serious threat and decided to release him from jail and abolish the Poll Tax, A Crown Proctor of Chilaw referring to Victor Corea said

After he abolished the Poll Tax, his popularity was so great that he could have contested any seat in the Ceylon Legislative Council and won it with a comfortable majority. At the zenith of his popularity as the Champion of the Common Man



England in 1899 to present his case against the Waste Lands Ordinance and returned to the country with substantial concessions to the peasantry after his interview with the Secretary of State.

The people had the opportunity of showing their appreciation of C.E. Corea's long and valuable services to the nation when he was elected without a contest to represent the North Western Province in the Legislative Council of 1921. As President of the Ceylon National Congress in 1924 and 1925, he led a delegation from the Congress Executive Committee to Jaffna in an enderayour to heal the Sinhala Tamilsplit on the question of reserving a seat for the Tamils in Colombo. It was a mission quite in character with his lifelong role as an uncompromising opponnent of communalism.

He had the rare distinction of being elected the President of the Jaffna Association and was the only Sinhalese who had been asked to be the President of the Association.

He fought relentlessy for his people and the British bureaucracy wilted under his elegant verbal thrusts. Even Sir Hugh Clifford was ratted by the forte of his stinging diatribes and once tried to silence him and his brother Victor, by referring to them as "the core of rot".

C.E. Corea was always kindly and courteous and his monumental learning did not spoil his inherent gentleness. In pubic life integrity was a characteristic and this he had as a hallmark. He earned for himself a sobriquet - "The Hampden of Ceylon" - which he deserved because of his unceasing championship of the people.

He was an artist, architect, historian and even theologian. He was one of the first readers of the Greek New Testament to show the unwarranted nature of Dr. Moffat's translation of St. Mathew where he renders a passage in Modernistic style. Although without intensive training as an architect or a painter, he was able to design his own, and cousin's houses, in traditional Sinhala patterns.

He was a master of the English language as Principle Woodward of Richmond and Warden Stone of S. Thomas' both recognized, and perhaps this was one of the reasons which catapulted him to fame in the political field. As a patriot he was bold and fearless and never lacked the courage of his

CHILAW TO HONOUR VICTOR COREA

The Secretary of the Urban Council, Chilaw has by letter dated 13.11.2001 addressed to Sri Sangabo Corea annexed the extracts of minutes of the Urban Council's meeting held on 29,10.2001 at which a Memorial for the late C.E. Victor S. Corea was formally approved. The site set a side for the memorial is at the entrance to the Sports Stadium along the Colombo Road.

The memorial will take the form of a statue erected against the backdrop of Victor Corea's fight against the poll tax and being imprisoned for revolting against the might of the British Government in the year 1912. The sequence of events will be depicted on the backdrop explaining the facts in story form, with approrpiate landscape to go with the statue and the backdrop. The memorial which is intended to be a landmark in Chilaw will have some features that Sangabo took note of when he visited John F. Kennedy's grave in Arlington Cemetery, inexpensive and tastefully done to create visual impact.

The ECFU will have to rely on a fund raiser through its membership and the public to raise the funds for the memorial. One of the leading architects in the country will be designing the memorial, waiving off professional charges as his contribution to honour a national hero whose protest compelled the British Government to abolish the poll tax and relieve the burden of people in this country paying the government a poll tax.


Vijaya and Sangabo are jointly handling this project. Any assistance in whatever form will be greatly appreciated.

MEMBERSHIP IN THE EDIRIMANNE COREA FAMILY UNION

Enrolment in the Edirimanne Corea Family Union must be supported with an application form duly completed and forwarded to the Secretary together with the Enrolment and Membership Fee of Rs. 1250 If it is by cheque, If should be drawn in favour of the Edirimanne Corea Family Union and crossed account payee.

There is only one type of membership and that is Life Membership which is covered by a one off payment of Rs. 1250. The steps to enrol and obtain membership is as follows:

HOW TO ENROL

01. You first need to obtain an Application Form from the Secretary or through any member of the Executive Committee you have easy access to.

02. Provide the information asked for in the Form and together with your Enrolment & Life Membership Fee of Rs.1250 forward it to the Secretary who will table your application at the meeting of the Executive Committee and have your application approved for enrolment.

03. The Executive Committee, in order to accommodate those who are unable to pay the full amount in a one off payment has devised an easy payment scheme the details of which are as follows:

(a) The first instalment payable is Rs.350

(b) Followed by 3 instalments of Rs. 300 each to be paid within a year

04. On being enrolled as a Life Member the individual concerned will be issued with a Membership Card which will come in useful at one time or another.

All those who are eligible for enrolment are advised to submit their applications without delay since the Membership Register is now being compiled and with costs increasing the membership fees may have to be increased shortly.



THE COREAS OF CHILAW

by C.E.C.Bulathsinghala

The Coreas of Chilaw are of a heroic mould. There are a few families in Ceylon that have produced such a stalwart line of heroes. The fiery Douglasses and the conquering Graemes are their counterparts in fair Caledonia, stern and wild. The flaming Fitz Geralds in Ireland are of a similar flavour.

When we think of the Coreas our minds go back to **Charlie Corea** (C.E.Corea). He was the compeer and fully the equal of Ramanathan Arunachalam and James Peiris. He had his education at Royal College. One of his class-mates was B.W.Bawa. Bawa, was considered the best speaker at College and Corea the best writer. C.E.Corea went at his own expense along with Sam Moonesinghe, Proctor, as a delegate of the Chilaw Association in 1899 to interview the Secretary of State on the Waste Lands Ordinance. Though not successful at the start, ultimate victory crowned his brow.

C.E.Corea, appeared in one of the biggest cases of all time in 1915. This was known as the Chilaw Reference Case and some of the questions at issue were:

- (1) Whether Ceylon was conquered?
- (2) Was it monarchy elective?
- (3) Was the king feudal owner of all land?
- (4) Was the Kandyan Convention a Treaty?
- (5) Whether the Ceylon Legislative Council had the right to pass such a law as the Waste Lands Ordinance?
- (6) Whether that Ordinance was not a violation of the fundamental rights of the people?

Charlie Corea, appeared for the plaintiff and James Vanlangenberg, Solicitor General appeared with Crown Counsel for the Crown. The trial occupied 13 days. The record ran to 600 pages. The judgement covered 150 pages. The Judge was H.E.Beven of the Civil Service. Judgement was entered for the Crown and the plaintiff had to pay the defendants the costs of the suit.

Another important event in the life of Charlie Corea was when he was convicted for contempt of Court and fined Rs.5,000 by Justice Wood Renton in the 'riot year' 1915. A. St. V. Jayewardene, who defended Charlie Corea obtained time to pay the fine. When Charlie Corea stepped in at Dornhorst's bungalow to inform him of the result as Dornhorst had very kindly advised him in the case, Corea got his first surprise. Dornhorst gave him a cheque for Rs.5,000 which Corea did not accept.

When Corea stepped into Dornhorst's house he was on his way to his brother's house at Colpetty. When he arrived there he was informed by his brother, Victor Corea that Usuf, the leader of the Muslims in Chilaw had walked up to the Registrar immediately after Corea had left the Court and planked down Rs.5,000 in cash unasked and without a soul knowing it. This act of Usuf gave the lie direct to the charge of communal antipathy. Corea paid the money back to Usuf. Here was an example of a Muslim going out of his way to help a Sinhalese and that of his own accord and altogether unsolicited.

When I think of Charlie Corea I think of Leonidas the Spartan King, John Hampden and Kosciusko the Pole. He was my guru in politics. But he was something more. As a master of chaste and elegant English prose I have not met his equal amongst

the Ceylonese. I am following the advice he gave me "Read the Bible, Addison and Milton, daily" he told me. And if I can frame a few lines in English the credit is due to Charles Edgar Corea and also to Winston Churchill, the War Leader, who advised me to read Gibbon daily. In return I unearthed for Churchill his genealogy up to the time of Matilda, the mother of the first Angevin King.

Victor Corea, was of a different type from Charlie Corea. He was more colourful, more picturesque and more flamboyant. The country owes a great debt of gratitude to him too. To him should go the sole credit for getting the Poll tax abolished. Ofcourse he had doughty followers in Messrs Goonesinha and P. Givendrasinghe. When the Labour Union was formed by Goonesinha, Victor Corea lent his dynamic leadership to the movement and gave it an aura of respectability. There was no movement that was concerned with the uprise of the underdog to which Victor Corea did not give wholehearted support.

Claude Corea was a statesman par excellence. His achievements are great, varied and multifarious. He was one of the fairy godmothers who presided at the birth of the Bank of Ceylon. His versatility, his brilliant talents and his great industry fitted him for leadership. He could have shone in any Cabinet or adorned any Government. Had he not been a Christian he might have been Sri Lanka's second Premier. He and I were members of the Executive Committee of the Ceylon National Congress from the earliest days. We always sat together and supported each other in the discussions. Claude Corea shone as a diplomat too. The infant Dominion of Ceylon needed longheaded leadership in the diplomatic field.

Where a strong man was needed or whose special pleading had to be pressed to the very limit D.S. Senanayake always turned to Corea. Personally I am under a deep debt of gratitude to him. When Claude Corea was High Commissioner in London, he took a personal delight in placing my letters before the Queen. Several communications from Buckingham Palace to me were addressed to the High Commissioner from whom they were despatched to me accompanied by a charming personal note.

Sir Senerat Gunawardene, sponsored Ceylon's entry to the UNO. Thereby he has immortalised his name. He is sure of his place in history as being the first Ceylonese to take his seat in the UNO.



But his tenure of office was short though brilliant. Claude Corea then got a long innings in the UNO. His contributions to debates were on par with those of a Halifax, Dulles or an Anthony Eden. Happy the land that had a representative of his calibre in the Councils of the World.

When I think of Shirley Corea at times I think of great Philip's mightier son (Alexander). But I am wrong there. The perspective should be great Chatham's mighty son, both equal, fully equal. Shirley was with me at Wesley College, when I was in the sixth form. One of Rev. Highfield's favourites, he was at the bottom of the school, not in talent, but in seniority. We chummed up then. He was the first boy in his class, brilliant, forceful and argumentative. He never looked back.

From Wesley he went to Royal. Last week he told me when we were discussing about the Speakership that he looks to Royal more as his Alma Mater as he spent six years there. He also spent three months at S.Thomas' he told me. Love of the motherland is a religion with him.

He has made his mark as a public man; he was a very successful Minister and now a still greater honour though of a different nature has devolved upon him. To succeed a man like Sir Albert Peries is not an easy task. But Shirley Corea is equal to any assignment. The administrative talents of his illustrious forebears have most assuredly descended upon him. When I read his palm last week the faint glimmer of a loftier honour was visible.

Twenty centuries of history look down upon him. And in the fullness of time the muse of history may yet acclaim him as the greatest of the Coreas.

In conclusion I am happy and proud to acclaim that the Coreas as one of the few families that have royal blood in their veins.

COREA FIRSTS

The first and only Corea to be knighted by the Queen, Sir Claude Corea was the second son of Windsor and Sarah Corea. A lawyer by profession he entered politics as the Member of Parliament for the Chilaw electorate. Subsequently he was returned uncontested to the same seat. He served as the Minister of Trade and Commerce in the D. S. Senanayake cabinet. He was Ceylon's first High Commissioner to Britain, accredited to France and the Netherlands. He was also

Ceylon's first Permanent Representative to the U.N.

James Clifford Aelian Corea, son of the late Terentia and Gate Mudliyar J.E.Corea was the first Ceylonese Principal of Royal College, taking over from Mr.E.L.Bradby.

The first Corea to be honoured with a Memorial in Chilaw is **C.E.Victor S.Corea**. The Memorial will take the form of ...

- A lifesize statue of Victor Corea in his ceremonial attire.
- A backdrop in copper finish, illustrating his deeds for the people.
- A landscaping that will add to the overall visual impact.

The foursome working on the project are: Sri Sangabo Corea, Vijaya Corea, Anura Dharmakirti and Lilani Dharmaratne.

OUR SECOND PRESIDENT



Charles Alfred Ernest Corea, born on 9th
June 1920, is the son of the late Dr.James
Alfred Ernest Corea and Mrs Mildred May
Corea (nee Wickremeratne).

He received his early education at Ladies College, Colombo 7 and later at S.Thomas'College, Mount Lavinia. He left College from the Cambridge Junior form to enable him, along with his mother, to nurse his father who suffered a stroke and was bedridden. After 3 years, at his father's death, he entered St.Mary's College, Chilaw to continue his studies and passed the Senior School Certificate examination. At St.Mary's College, he captained the cricket eleven.

He left school to join the Excise Department as an Excise Inspector and was stationed at Hikkaduwa.

Being the eldest in a family of four, he shouldered immense responsibility in caring for his widowed mother, brother Malcolm and two sisters, Euna and Ernestine. He married Patricia Samarasekera of Bishop's College, and left the Excise Department to join Law College, Colombo. Passing out as an Attorney-at-Law, he practised in the Panadura and Horana Courts Complex as a Civil Lawyer. It did not take him long to be one of the leading lawyers, carving out a lucrative practice for himself. He acted as District Judge on several occasions till his retirement.

Ernie was closely associated with St.Luke's Church, Mampe, often being the Diocesan Representative of the Parish. He still continues to take a keen interest in the activities of St.Luke's, Mampe.

He inaugurated the Lions Club of Piliyandala and was its Charter President. Ernie was also involved with the Founder and first President of the Edirimanne Corea Family Union, the late Henri Corea. Together, they drafted the Constitution of the ECFU and later was the second President and is currently the Patron.

Ernie is very simple and unassuming in his ways, reaching out to the old as well as the young. He has a rich sense of humour and is highly respected for his forthright ways.

Ernie and Pat have four children, Ernest, the eldest who works for Telecom in Canada, Dr. Eugene, practising in Piliyandala, Mrs Patricia Abeysekera, Head of Telecom External Services, Sri Lanka and Mrs Avril Salgado, Accountant residing with her family in Canada.

SPOT LIGHT



Dr Vijaya Corea, the Immediate Past President of the ECFU is the son of Dr. Sidhartha and Amybelle Corea. Educated at S.Thomas' College, Mount Lavinia, Vijaya, who was following a course in Chartered Accountancy changed his plans because of the craze he developed for mass media. He took off by undertaking a six month assignment in commercial broadcasting merely as a hobby, just for kicks. In just one year however, he found that every



sponsor was insisting that the voice of Vijaya Corea must be used in his commercial or sponsored programme. There was no show or dance that took place without Vijaya waxing his eloquence through the microphone. Soon he was described as Sri Lanka's Number One Compere.

His ingenuity in broadcasting was such that when the regular announcer in the Sinhala Commercial Service of what was then the Ceylon Broadcasting Corporation failed to turn up for duty, Vijaya, using his presence of mind, took a quick decision to open the Sinhala transmission by handling all the announcements himself thereon and kept it going for a good half an hour until a relief announcer was brought in. This resulted in the radio station not losing any revenue and for which he received a commendation from the Chairman & Director-General, Neville Jayaweera.

When Singapore Airlines was in need of an expert compere to handle their very sophisticated advertising campaign for Air Lanka they wasted no time and picked Vijaya for the job that took him from London to Paris, Frankfurt, Zurich, Bangkok and Singapore. The advertising campaign with the theme, 'a taste of paradise' was acknowledged as one of the best examples of result-oriented advertising and Vijaya played a key role in giving it the desired clout. He was the first compere to be paid in foreign exchange.

Vijaya, also had the unique distinction of performing to an audience that was made up of Kings, Queens, Princes, Princesses and the Heads of State who attended the 5th Non-aligned Summit which was chaired by Prime Minister Sirima R.D.Bandaranaike. This also signalled the first time that a Sri Lankan telecaster appeared worldwide on a TV transmission. After the inauguration by Mrs Bandaranaike, Vijaya took over to present a musical and cultural show from the BMICH as a forerunner to the commencement of the 5th Non-aligned Summit Conference.

His popularity soared and when Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip visited Sri Lanka, President J.R. Jayewardene picked Vijaya to do the honours at the Cultural Show that preceded the State Banquet and was later presented to the Queen and her consort.

Vijaya, has also created history by reading the News in Sinhala in the absence of the regular news reader over the All Asia transmission, and has been voted by radio listeners as The Most Popular DJ in 1974, '75 and '76 during the three years when the award was presented.

He reached the zenith in his chosen field when he was appointed Director-General of the Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation in December 1991 and was also appointed to the Boards of the Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation and the National Film Corporation.

He is today, a disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ and a Minister of the Gospel. He is a National Christian, serving for several years in the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Colombo and on the Governing Boards of many church institutions.

He is currently, the President of the Sri Lanka Veteran Broadcasters' Association and is also the Vice President of the Sri Lanka Press Club of which Her Excellency the President is ex-officio, the Director of Information.

Married to Ranjini, they have a son, Viran and daughter Sashika.

INFORMATION Xtra - Ordinary

Srikumaradas Viran Corea and Sanjeeva Victor Corea were in the same class at S.Thomas'Prep School, Kollupitiya when Mr.J.S.L.Fernando was the headmaster. Even though both Coreas had the same initials they made sure that their reports never went to the wrong father and made sure that the school fees of one Corea which was higher, was not paid by the other Corea's parents. That's what you call a solid Corean strategy!

There were 3 Nihal Coreas: One was Sir Claude's son, the second was Bertram's son and the third was Denzil's son They all got on famously with no mix-up whatsoever!

And in Lever Brothers (Ceylon) Limited at one and the same time there was in Marketing N.Corea (Nihal) and S.Corea (Sri Sangabo). When mutual friends phoned and there were cross connections the inquiry was whether the caller wanted to speak to North Corea or South Corea!

It has gone on record that Principal Woodward of Mahinda and Warden Stone of S.Thomas' both acknowledged C.E.Corea as a Master of the English Language!

C.E.Victor S.Corea, his youngest brother clashed with the highest Bureaucrat in the country when he and Governor, Sir Hugh Clifford figured in one of the most talked about verbal battles because he thought that the Governor's reference to 'a core of rot' referred to the Corea brothers and others who joined them in the fight to end colonial rule and usher in Independence. There was an exchange of letters between Victor Corea and Sir Hugh Clifford that must surely rank amongst the best in satire, with the choicest words of the English Language used and yet without the use of a single unsavoury word.

On the Excise Bill, Victor Corea by his letter to Sir Hugh Clifford dated 29" April 1927 wrote ... I opposed the Excise Bill because I thought that by placing the country at the mercy of these cormorant renters, and opening toddy shops in practically every village, my poor fellow-countrymen would become more and more addicted to the use of intoxicating liquor.

I have always been for total prohibition.

I spoke my mind to you quite frankly; and I expected similar courtesy from you. I regret that you should have had recourse to veiled insinuations, which "pass by me as the idle wind."

Despite the clashes, the respect that Governor, Sir Hugh Clifford had for Victor Corea was so great that when Victor Corea's son, Carlton returned from England after passing the Civil Service with distinction, he personally wrote...

I should be very glad to see your son if you will send him to call upon me; or better still if you will bring him to see me.

LANDMARKS IN THE 70S

There is a popular saying that Chilaw is famous for 3 Cs ... Coreas, Crabs and Coconuts! Though small in size, Chilaw had an irresistible charm of its own and whenever someone was transferred out of Chilaw there was a noticeable feeling of sadness that gripped the heart of every man, woman and child at the time of parting.

Chilaw, had its many attractions ... an unpolluted beach, the 'Water's Meet', an absolutely romantic spot where the lagoon and the sea met, the running waters of the Deduru-Oya, the historic Munneswaram Temple, the imposing Roman Catholic Cathedral, the Bishop's House tucked away in a meticulously maintained



coconut property, the Courts Complex located in a sprawling park shaded with banyan trees, St. Mary's College which had produced several national sports stars, the Holy Family and Carmelite Convents which had moulded many a distinguished school leaver, the Buddhist Pirivena which was the seat of learning Sinhala, Pali and Sanskrit, the Chilaw Sports Club which had a galaxy of super stars, the lagoon that harboured many varieties of pada boats, the vast stretches of paddy fields, the Crabs, which tasted like nothing on earth, the Coconuts which gave the town its wealth and ofcourse the Coreas who were a force to reckon with!

My journey through Chilaw begins at Deduru-Oya which has figured prominently as the venue for some of the most enjoyable dips and picnic lunches I have had in the company of my parents, family and friends. Box guitars, bongos, maracas and piano accordion were a part of our paraphernalia. The soft sandy banks, the giant mara trees and the warm waters of the Deduru-Oya was the perfect prescription for a healthy outing.

Moving along Puttalam Road the first landmark is the Bishop's House where the Rt.Rev.Dr.Edmund Peiris lived. He was a scholar and a man of God who stood 10 feet tall, highly respected by all.

Passing the unprotected railway crossing and entering the Chilaw town limits on the left is the old walauwa named 'Sinhapura' the residence of C.E.Victor S.Corea, Advocate of the Supreme Court. His garden of nearly 3 acres was fully planted with coconut and there was every conceivable fruit bearing tree that included luscious bunches of grapes during the season. There were over 7 varieties of mangoes, seedless guava, sapodilla, custard apple, pomegranate, bananas, oranges, woodapple, lime, lemon, nelli and damson. The roses, the cassia and the jacaranda gave the garden surrounding the house a splash of contrasting colours. Victor Corea always had two cars, the last being a Chevrolet Fleetmaster and a Vauxhall Velox. Vivienne and Victor had Leila, Charlie, Chandrani, Ratna, Rupa, Lihini, Sri Sangabo and Indira.

Living as a bachelor in the adjoining house in the same compound was Victor Corea's son, Norman, an accomplished violinist, pianist and composer who gave violin lessons to a select band of pupils. He had an easy and comfortable life with all meals supplied from the main house.

Two blocks away on the opposite side was 'Enashmere' the residence of Ashley Corea, Proctor of the Supreme Court and Notary Public. It is said that every Sunday, Ashley took off on his push bicycle to his estate as a routine exercise, despite the fact that he had a posh American Plymouth. This explains how he managed to remain slim and physically fit. His wife, Ena was a gifted pianist and their family of 5 girls and 2 boys were known to be very musical. On and off one could hear voices in harmony to piano accompaniment. Ena and Ashley had Sabrina, Roxina, Christabelle, Ariya, Brenda, Ranjith, Nirmali and Manorani.

Next door was 'Edirilla Gedera' the residence of C.E.Corea, Proctor of the Supreme Court. As the President of the Ceylon National Congress he led a delegation from the Congress Executive Committee to Jaffna in an endeavour to heal the Sinhala-Tamil split on the question of reserving a seat for the Tamils in Colombo. Just when it seemed that the country was going to benefit increasingly from his devoted labours, wisdom, counsel and experience, C.E.Corea's crowded political life was cut short and terminated with distressing suddeness in 1932. In response to an invitation to address a meeting in Jaffna after being elected President of the Jaffna Association, he set out by car but was prevented from keeping that engagement by an unfortunate accident, which untimely forced him to retire from public life. Designed by C.E.Corea himself, 'Edirilla Gedera' had architectural beauty that was unique in many ways. Pearly and Charlie had Leila, Shirley, Nesta, Elaine, Swarna, Charlie, Earle, Doreen and Nan.

Close by, on the opposite side of the road lived Bertram Corea, his wife Rene and their one and only child, Nihal. Bertram, the eldest son of Dr. Ernest Corea was an Advocate of the Supreme Court, practising in Chilaw at that time.

Adjoining was 'Fairlyn' the residence of Jimeaux Corea. It is said that he had the biggest dairy in Chilaw in the backyard of his house, managed by his daughter Ira, who was also a gifted pianist. Adeline and Jimeaux had Ordella, Ena, Ira and Manel.

Next door was 'Serendib' the residence of Dr.Ernest Corea. Here too the architecture was unique, designed by Dr.Corea himself. Although he was a doctor of medicine he was an outstanding artist and enjoyed painting during his leisure hours. Although he too, like his brothers C.E. (Charlie) and Victor always had the interests of the common

man at heart, did not take to politics. He however, enjoyed treating the poor and curing the sick. May and Dr.Ernest had Ernest, Eunice, Malcolm and Ernestine. Dr.Corea's elder daughter, Gwendoline also lived with them.

Down 'Sinhapura Road was 'Sharon' the residence of Carlton Corea, living in retirement after a distinguished career in the Ceylon Civil Service. He was a pianist, composer, poet and artist and what was amazing is that he excelled in everything he put his hand to. A brilliant administrator, he turned down a diplomatic post offered to him by Prime Minister, Dudley Senanayake. A well read man, he could talk on any subject under the sun and hold his listeners spellbound. He had the knack of moving with the old and the young and his company was a sheer delight. Kumari and Carlton had Rohan, Lilani and Shiran.

In the hub of activity and bang in front of the Courts Complex was 'Sigiriya', the residence of Esme Corea, Advocate of the Supreme Court who later was a District Judge. He was married to Swarna, also a Corea. 'Sigiriya' was a landmark in Chilaw because of its impressive architecture and its impressive features tied up with the historic background of the Coreas. It is here at 'Sigiriya' that a grand banquet had been hosted by the Coreas when Mahatma Gandhi came to visit Chilaw.

Tucked away in close proximity to the shopping centre was 'Maha Gedera' the residence of S.C.Shirley Corea, the leading Proctor and Notary Public at that time. He took over from where his illustrious father, C.E.Corea left and surpassed everybody's expectations with his outstanding achievements. He lived by himself devoting all his time to his legal practice and his political career. He was an outstanding Minister and later, one of Parliament's greatest Speakers, an acknowledged authority on Erskine May. He was a dynamic member of the Corea Clan who kept the family flag flying high. A lover of cars, his, was the only Mercedes Benz in Chilaw.

The first house of the Coreas in the beach was Russel's. With his wife Nesta and their children, Mayadunne, Nalini, Shirani, Damayanthi and Kamini they lived a quiet and healthy life on the beach in close proximity to the Rest House.

A little beyond lived C.A.L.Corea, Crown Proctor who was also Acting District Judge. He smoked a cigar, was big made

In close proximity lived Stanley Corea, his wife Ida and daughter, Ranee.

These are the Coreas who occupied centre stage in Chilaw in the Forties. The Coreas have many things in common. They are musical, artistic, had an excellent command of the English Language, had beautiful handwriting, were very national minded and above all were proud of their family name. Whether males or females, they were known to dress well and tastefully. The girls, generally were good looking and they all had parents who were conscious of this fact as a result of which they were known to be heavily escorted and securely guarded! It was not easy for any young man to break through that security ring and get close to a Miss Corea. The males, had the reputation of being hot blooded Romeos. A little bit of research will prove this to be true. Most of the Coreas, being Anglicans, received their education at S.Thomas'College while a lesser number studied at Royal. The fairer sex who preferred to study in Colombo went to Ladies College whilst the younger generation remained in Chilaw, and studied in the Convent. One thing that runs through every nerve and fibre in a Corea, is the pride they have of their ancestry. All, without exception, consciously endeavour to preserve their good name.

Falling in love with a Corea girl was understandable, because there were a host of pretty girls, one better than the other, but getting past the parents, was a mission impossible. That explains why I am not married to one!!

Where the eligible bachelor Coreas were concerned they were an easy bait but ever so difficult to assess, so much so that many young damsels gave up even before they made any headway!!

The Coreas, born into a family that is highly respected have tasted power but what is visibly great is that they have not lost their heads and that speaks volumes for this unique family!

MEMBERSHIP IN THE ECEU


